Congratulations to Rachel Blackburn, Head of Care and Designated Safeguarding Lead, as she recently qualified as a Mental health Lead in Education. This work, which was funded by the Department for Education (DFE), took about a year to complete and Rachel got her certificate in February. This has given Rachel the skills to train and develop staff's knowledge and to signpost to resources that may be helpful to children, young people and staff.



Mind mate and CAMHS referrals are taking a significantly long time since coming out of covid as pupils were isolated and we are now seeing the impact of this across the education sector as a whole. Rachel is always happy to talk anything through and has been doing some work with pupils in Ellington about coping, understanding and reflecting on our own responses to stressors.

Rachel also played a major part in facilitating a wellbeing day for all the staff in January. There were lots of different sessions made available and people were given the choice of which ones they wanted to do. Rachel said "I know sometimes it's really stressful to make time for our own wellbeing amongst the continual pressures in Education. It was our best intentions to give back to staff and show you all how much we appreciate the impact you have on our young people. For every role in the school, it leads back to us fulfilling lives and being responsive".

Rachel left us with this quote "Your life has purpose. Your story is important. Your dreams count. Your voice matters. You were born to make an impact."






Our Teaching Mass—The Eucharist


This Lent, St John's has been raising money to give to a Christian charity which is involved in relief and development work in Afghanistan.

CEOP's Blog: On Line Gaming Particularly Roblox



Roblox is an application where online gamers make their own games in an on line world. It is a HUGELY popular game. It has a social media element too and, perhaps one of the reasons it appeals to youngsters is that to us parents it can seem confusing and we just don't get it! Roblox can be fun and engaging but because it is user generated it doesn't have the same restrictions as commercially made content. Therefore the quality can be variable and it does need parental monitoring.

Roblox also has items to buy to enhance the games and Robux, currency that can be won and exchanged for real cash. It is easy for a child to use, if a device has a card or PayPal details stored on it.

Suggestions- (This could apply for any on line gaming).

Under the age of 12- No Roblox at all.

Over 12 - Only allow Roblox for a limited amount of time - 30 minutes (set a timer and put your own passcode on a device. Use only in a public area such as a living room.

Do not allow the spending of money on the application, perhaps allow once a youngster can be responsible for their own finances or have their own bankcard at 14 or even 16+.

Set parental controls as tightly as you can. Allow no chat at all and only allow games which Roblox has decided are appropriate for that age group. You can do all this in the settings.

Finally make sure your child's social life is balanced -Real Life, and On Line Life.
